Kajimaya

*In many cultures, there is a custom of having respect for the aged and special celebrations are held for those who have reached a certain age. In Okinawa, persons who attain their 97th birthday are particularly honored by their family and friends. This celebration is called **Kajimaya**, which literally means "windmill."*

In Okinawa, sometimes these long-lived persons are given small parades where they ride in convertibles through their community waving toy windmills in their hands. According to Okinawan folktale, a person who lived to 97 years should celebrate as if they were newborn babies. Since the old may again become like children and play in childlike ways, a toy windmill is symbolically presented to them.

Sensei Terry Higa of Hawaii Taiko Kai will be conducting a taiko demonstration at the Maui Okinawa Cultural Center on Saturday, June 19, 2004, 2 p.m. Anyone who is interested is invited to attend the demonstration, which will be followed by a question and answer time.

The Mitsufumi Ryu Hozon Kai style of Koten or Classical Okinawan drumming utilizes two drums: a large drum (Hira Daiko) placed vertically and a small drum (Shime Taiko) placed horizontally. The drummer typically sits on the floor “Japanese” style and accompanies Okinawan music.

Sensei Higa hopes to start a class on Maui. Class times to be determined at a later date. Participants must be at least 12 years of age or older.

If you are Okinawan, you may be able to trace your roots to a town or village (“sōn”) in Okinawa. Many are listed here. (Jin Kai means people’s organization or association).

On Maui, we have one Okinawan club, which is made up of people who come from all areas of Okinawa. Thus, “Okinawa Ken” (country or prefecture). There is also another association on the island called Maui Kin-Cho JinKai, whose members’ roots are from Kin village. On Oahu, most of the clubs are affiliated with a village.

If you don’t know what “sōn” you are from, now is a good time to ask your parents or grandparents.

When you do find out, the Maui Okinawa Kenjin Kai wants to know. Please call the office at 242-1560 and let us know this information. We are keeping a database. Thank you!

When our grandparents and great grandparents immigrated to Hawaii and settled in plantation towns, the Okinawan population banded together out of necessity as they struggled to survive and from sheer homesickness no doubt. A century later, Uchinanchu have definitely risen to the challenge by becoming successful business people, workers and public leaders. Yet, that same sense of community still exists and is evident at Maui Okinawa Kenjin Kai gatherings.

The traditional New Year's celebration--Shinnen Enkai --was held on Saturday, March 6, 2004. A full house enjoyed the delicious potluck dinner. One reason for the long wait in line for the meal is that everyone carefully looks over all the different dishes so that they won't miss their favorite foods!

The program kicked off with an encore presentation of the 75th Anniversary PowerPoint Video. **Dennis Shinsato** produced this 15-minute collage of the club's history. The video was first shown at last year's 75th Anniversary Celebration in November.
